SWORD



This sword is identified to Lieutenant Jesse F. Eddy, "A" Company Massachusetts 7th Infantry Regiment. He enlisted on 15 June, 1861 and resigned 23 March, 1863, and though his service was less than 2 years he saw the elephant. His Muster Sheet show he was present with his command during the **Siege of Yorktown** April 5-May 4; **Battle of Williamsburg** May 5; **Bottom's Bridge** May 19-21; Reconnaissance toward Richmond May 23; **Battle of Fair Oaks, Seven Pines**, May 31-June 1; Seven days before Richmond June 25-July 1; **Oak Grove**, near Seven Pines, June 25; James River Road, near Fair Oaks, June 29; and **Malvern Hill** July 1. After which, he was on Special Duty as the Acting Ordnance Officer at the Division, a position he held until discharged March 1863 due to health issues.

The sword is a standard French import Model 1850 Foot Officers sword with a plain blade, but maker marked on the top spine. The hilt is tight with no movements, but shows wear on the grip which retained the original twisted wire. The blade has some spotting and period sharpening with some nicks. The scabbard leather is complete but flimsy and weak with all original mounts. The top throat mount is identified to **Jesse F Eddy May 1861**.

Jesse F. Eddy period of service

The 7th Massachusetts Infantry Regiment lost 4 officers and 76 enlisted men killed or mortally wounded and 2 officers and 72 enlisted men to disease during the Civil War. It is honored by a monument at Gettysburg.

THE SEVENTH REGIMENT.

THE Seventh Regiment was among the first of the three-years organizations, being composed almost entirely of Bristol County men recruited through the efforts of its first colonel, Darius N. Couch. Its rendezvous was Camp Old Colony at Taunton, where on the 15th of June, 1861, its ten companies were mustered into the United States service for three years, the officers being as follows:—

Colonel, Darius N. Couch of Taunton; lieutenant colonel, Chester W. Green of Fall River; major, David E. Holman of Attleboro; surgeon, S. Atherton Holman of Boston; assistant surgeon, Z. Boylston Adams of Boston; adjutant, Othniel Gilmore of Raynham; quartermaster, Daniel Edson, Jr., of Dighton; sergeant major, Edward L. Langford of Fall River; quartermaster sergeant, Dan Packard of Abington; commissary sergeant, John B. Burt of Fall River; hospital steward, Horace B. Sherman of Boston; principal musicians, Robert Sheehan of Fall River and Thomas Dolan of Taunton; leader of band, Zadoc Thompson, Jr., of Halifax.

Civil War Division Ordnance Officer

During the Civil War, a Civil War division ordnance officer was an officer responsible for managing weapons and ammunition within a specific division of the army. They ensured the availability and readiness of all firearms, artillery, and other military stores, and were often involved in the care, repair, and storage of these items.

Here is a more detailed breakdown:

- **Responsibilities:**

Division ordnance officers were tasked with managing the ordnance stores within their division, meaning they were responsible for the care, storage, and maintenance of all weapons and ammunition. They also helped with the distribution of supplies to units within the division.

- **Role in Supply:**

During the Civil War, the Ordnance Department played a critical role in supplying the Union army with the vast quantities of weapons and ammunition needed to wage war. Division ordnance officers helped facilitate the flow of these supplies down to the various units under their command, ensuring they were adequately supplied with arms and ammunition.

- **Key Skills:**

These officers needed to be knowledgeable about different types of weapons, their maintenance, and their proper storage. They often worked closely with non-commissioned officers, such as ordnance sergeants, who were responsible for the day-to-day care and storage of weapons and ammunition at specific locations.

The attention of officers of the Army responsible for Ordnance Stores, and especially of Ordnance and Acting Ordnance Officers, is called to the following General Order from the War Department:

GENERAL ORDERS, }

Washington, May 7, 1864.

Acting Ordnance Officers of Divisions, Brigades, &c.

For the purpose of more perfectly organizing the service of the Ordnance Department, as connected with Armies in the field and the Military Departments, and at the same time securing for that Department the services of a body of efficient officers, trained to its special duties, it is ordered:

1. That there shall be attached to the General Staff of every Division in the Army of the United States, and to that of each Brigade or Military District, where no Division organization exists, an *Acting Ordnance Officer*, who shall be held directly responsible to the Chief Ordnance Officer at the General Headquarters of the Army or Department in which he may be serving, for the manner in which he shall perform the special duties of his office.

2. These officers shall be Captains and Lieutenants in the line of the Regular or Volunteer Service, selected for the position on account of their peculiar fitness for it, and, if possible, from those who have already had some experience in Ordnance duty. They shall be appointed and assigned to duty by the Commander of the Army or Department, and by him alone, upon the recommendation of the senior Ordnance Officer on duty at General Headquarters; and all removals or changes of station of these officers are to be made by the same authority, and on the recommendation of the senior Ordnance Officer.

3. It shall be the duty of such officers to keep themselves thoroughly acquainted with the armament of each Regiment and Battery in the Division, Brigade, or District with or in which they serve; to see that all arms, accoutrements, and equipments are kept in a serviceable condition by timely repairs, and to promptly report to the Chief Ordnance Officer of the Army or Department, all injuries to, or losses of, Ordnance property, which may be due to the neglect or carelessness of regimental or company commanders.

4. They will have charge of the ammunition supply trains attached to the Division or Brigade, and will be held responsible that ample supplies of ammunition are, at all times, in the hands of the troops, and that there is a full reserve supply in the train, or the District depot.

5. Immediately after an engagement, in case our forces hold the field, they will take charge of all Ordnance and Ordnance Stores found on that portion of it occupied by the Division or Brigade to which they are attached; they will see that regimental and company commanders collect and secure all arms, accoutrements, and ammunition belonging to soldiers of their companies or regiments, who have been killed or wounded, or who have abandoned such supplies; they will give receipts for all such Ordnance Stores as are no longer needed by the regiment, and will cause them to be sent, together with all captured Ordnance Stores, of whatever description, to the nearest Ordnance Depot or Arsenal, for deposit and repair. All defects in arms, ammunition, or any other Ordnance Stores, coming under their observation, will, at once, be reported to the Chief Ordnance Officer of the Army or Department, together with all the information to be obtained, which may aid the Ordnance Department to correct the evil.

6. It shall be their duty to ascertain, at the close of every official quarter, whether the Ordnance and Ordnance Stores in hands of the troops have been duly accounted for by the officers responsible for them, for the whole time they are so responsible, and to report all delinquent officers to senior Ordnance Officers at General Headquarters, to be, by him, reported to the Chief of Ordnance, at Washington.

7. All requisitions for Ordnance and Ordnance Stores for the use of any troops in the Division, Brigade, or District, must be duly approved by them before being transmitted to General Headquarters, and they will be held responsible that all requisitions, so transmitted, are made in strict compliance with the regulations of the Ordnance Department.

8. In addition to these duties, they will promptly execute all special orders which may, from time to time, be given them by the Chief Ordnance Officer to whom they report.

9. In order that the Ordnance Department may be kept fully advised of the names of all officers who are thus temporarily attached to it, a report of the Acting Ordnance Officers in every Army or Department, designating the Division, Brigade, or District, to which they are attached, shall be made, on the last day of every month, to the Chief of Ordnance, at Washington, D. C., by the senior Ordnance Officer of each Army or Department.

10. Hereafter, whenever it may become necessary to establish temporary Ordnance Depots for the service of an Army in the field, it shall be done only by the order of the officer commanding the Army or Department, on the recommendation of his Chief Ordnance Officer. The officers to take charge of such Depots shall all be selected by the Chief Ordnance Officer, and assigned to duty, or transferred from one Depot to another, by the officer commanding the Army or Department, and by him alone. The names of all such Depots, and those of the officers in charge of them, will at once be forwarded to the Chief of Ordnance, at Washington, D. C., and their names will be included in the monthly report of Acting Ordnance Officers of Divisions prescribed in the preceding paragraph.

1. In order to carry out the first and second paragraphs of the above order, it shall be the duty of the Chief Ordnance Officer at the Headquarters of an Army or Military Department, immediately upon his assuming the duties of his office, to ascertain whether there is at the Headquarters of each Division of the Army or Department, or, where no Division organization exists, at the Headquarters of each Brigade or District, a competent and efficient Acting Ordnance Officer. In case no such officer is on duty at such headquarters, or where the Acting Ordnance Officer so detailed is inefficient or incapable of performing the duties properly, he will take measures to select from the officers in the Division, Brigade, or District, of the regular or volunteer service, an officer (if possible, a captain) whose education, military experience, and habits, fit him for such a position.

The essential requisites for an Acting Ordnance Officer are, familiarity with the different kinds of Ordnance Stores used by an Army in the field, a general knowledge of the method of obtaining and accounting for such supplies as prescribed by the Ordnance Department, promptness and fidelity in the execution of duty, accuracy in all business transactions, firmness in adherence to the requirements of such Regulations of the Army as bear directly on his duties, and general integrity of character.

Where it can be done, and the officers can be spared, captains should be selected in preference to lieutenants, as their rank will give more weight to their authority, and they usually will have had a larger experience in the service.

2. To enable these officers to comply with the third paragraph of this order, they will, at least every fortnight, make a personal examination of the condition of the armament of every battery, company, or regiment in the Brigade, Division, or District, with or in which they are doing duty; noting all such stores as may be required, either to make the armament effective, or to bring up the supplies of ammunition to the prescribed amount, causing all necessary requisitions for such stores to be properly made out, and, after being duly approved at the headquarters to which they are attached, to be forwarded to the Chief Ordnance Officer for his sanction.

If the means for making all current repairs to arms, accoutrements, and horse equipments, are not in possession of the regiments, Acting Ordnance Officers will see that they are provided; but care will be taken that there are placed at the disposal of each organization only such tools and materials as their real necessities may require.

The following requirements of the first paragraph of General Order, No. 189, from the War Department, series of 1862, will be particularly observed:

* * * * *
"Commanding officers of all regiments armed with any muskets, rifles, or carbines, other than the Springfield rifled musket, model of 1855-'61, are authorized to detail from their regiments each a competent and skillful mechanic to act as an armorer, to repair the arms of the regiment. Suitable tools, and the necessary spare parts, will be provided by the Ordnance Department."
* * * * *

In no case will forges be issued by the Ordnance Department to companies or regiments of cavalry—all cavalry horses being shod by the Quartermaster's Department.

In all cases coming under the observation of Acting Ordnance Officers, when it is apparent that any damage to, or loss of, Ordnance Stores has occurred from the neglect of officers charged with their care, a written report of the case, covering every particular, will immediately be made to the Chief Ordnance Officer of the Army or Department, and the attention of the Division commanders will be called to it, in a similar manner, in order that proper steps may be taken to correct the evil or punish the offender. The requirements of this paragraph will be particularly observed during and after an action, in cases where artillery, or small arms are abandoned to the enemy through the cowardice or neglect of those to whom they are entrusted, whether it be officers or men.

3. Division Ordnance Officers will call on the quartermaster of the division for a sufficient number of wagons for the special use of the Ordnance train, which wagons they will see are appropriated to this purpose, and to no other.

When the train is large, they should endeavor to have an officer of the Quartermaster's Department detailed for duty with it, who, acting conjointly with themselves, will the better care for supplies, and see that no transportation is diverted from the purpose for which it has been set apart.

4. After an engagement, every article of Ordnance Stores should be removed from the field if possible, and at the earliest practicable moment, in order that the enemy may glean no supplies therefrom in case they should obtain possession of the ground. All arms and accoutrements turned in by officers of regiments in which losses are reported, will be received, *provided*, such officers have proper orders for so doing—company officers showing the order of their regimental commanders, and regimental commanders that of the brigade commander, as their authority for the transfer of property, based on the losses their commands have sustained.

5. By the regulations of the Ordnance Department, the Chief Ordnance Officer of every Army or Department is required to send to the Chief of Ordnance, at Washington, D. C., at the end of every month, a report of all officers of the Army, other than company and regimental commanders, who have been, at any previous time, responsible for Ordnance property for which they have not duly accounted to the Ordnance Department, and the date when the responsibility commenced.—(See Circular No. 25, from the Ordnance Office, series of 1863.)

This report is prepared from data obtained by the Acting Ordnance Officers of Divisions, Brigades, or Districts, and these officers should see that these reports are perfectly accurate and reliable. A copy of each monthly report so made to the Chief Ordnance Officer must be retained by the Division Ordnance Officer.

In order to carry out the duties prescribed in the sixth paragraph of this order, every Acting Ordnance Officer will, between the 20th and 30th days of the month succeeding the termination of each official quarter, make to the Chief Ordnance Officer of the Army or Department in which he may be serving, on the blanks provided by the Ordnance Department, and in accordance with the Form herewith furnished, a report of all officers in the Division, Brigade, or District with or in which they are serving, who have been, during the preceding quarter, responsible for any Ordnance property whatever, and who have failed to send their quarterly returns, accounting for the

same, to the Chief of Ordnance, at Washington, D. C., within *twenty* days after the expiration of that quarter, as prescribed by the Regulations of the Army.

The officers who command companies and regiments, as also those whose names appear on the monthly report just alluded to, (Form No. 31,) being those from whom such returns are due, it becomes the business of the Acting Ordnance Officer to ascertain whether they have fulfilled their duty in this respect. This may be done either by personal examination or by letter; but, in either case, the Acting Ordnance Officer will be held responsible for the accuracy of this report.

Division Ordnance Officers will fill up and transmit to the senior Ordnance Officers their reports on Form 31 (c,) as herewith given; which original report will be forwarded to the Chief of Ordnance as promptly as possible, accompanied by a letter of transmittal.

6. The attention of Ordnance and Acting Ordnance Officers is called to the requirements of Circular No. 12, series of 1863, from this office, regarding requisitions for Ordnance Stores. They must be made out in strict accordance with the notes printed on Form 22, and the Division Ordnance Officer should examine them carefully before they are approved and forwarded to the depot or to the Chief Ordnance Officer, at General Headquarters.

As a general rule, no requisitions from an Army in the field, or from any portion of a Department, should be filled by a Division or Depot officer, or be forwarded to the Chief of Ordnance, at Washington, D. C., in compliance with the requirements of Circular No. 12, of 1863, without having been carefully examined and approved by the Chief Ordnance Officer at Army, or Department Headquarters. But as the movements of Army, or Department Headquarters, sometimes render it impracticable for the officer who fills such requisitions to submit them to the senior Ordnance Officer for his approval, either before or after the issue is made, he will, in all cases where this exigency arises, give to the Acting Ordnance Officer in charge of supplies *authority in writing* to act upon requisitions, in such cases, without submitting them to him; and all requisitions forwarded to this office on which such issues have been made, and which it is desirable to cover with an order for supplies direct from the Chief of Ordnance, must either be accompanied by a copy of this *written authority*, or, where a copy of such authority has already been forwarded, allusion must be made to it in the letter to this office transmitting the requisitions.

The senior Ordnance Officer, in transmitting to this office his monthly list of Ordnance Depots, as required by the tenth paragraph of the foregoing order, will be careful to designate those to the officers in charge of which he has given this authority to fill requisitions without submitting them to him for approval.

7. The monthly report of Acting Ordnance Officers and Ordnance Depots in every Army or Department, required by paragraphs 9 and 10 of the foregoing General Order, will be made in the form herein prescribed, blanks for which will be supplied from this office.

No Acting Ordnance Officers whose names do not appear on this monthly list will be recognized by this Department, unless it can be shown that the omission was an accidental one.

In this connection, the attention of the Chief Ordnance Officer at Army Headquarters is called to the following extract from Circular No. 27, series of 1863, from this office:

* * * * *

"Hereafter, whenever in any army or military department a temporary depot is established, the Chief Ordnance Officer at headquarters will at once send to this office copies of the orders establishing such depot and assigning an officer to its charge. He will also see that this officer makes to this office daily reports of all receipts and issues on Form No. 32, and the weekly statement of stores on hand, (Form No. 34,) so long as the depot is continued, and that he is provided with proper blanks."
